Brislin to Receive Lifetime Award

IAIR Fellow, Richard Brislin will be awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award at the 2017 Staten Island conference. Dr. Brislin earned his Ph.D. at The Pennsylvania State University in 1969 and went on to teach, conduct groundbreaking research, and direct programs at Western Washington State University, Georgetown University, the University of British Columbia, The East-West Center, the University of Hawaii, and multiple visiting professorships.

Dr. Brislin is a Fellow in both the American Psychological Association and the Association for Psychological Science. His publications include more than twenty books and edited volumes, dozens of book chapters, and more than fifty journal articles spanning over four decades. A Senior Fellow at the East-West Center for more than twenty years, Dr. Brislin has trained and influenced generations of scholars studying intercultural relations.

Schachner to Receive Early Career Award



Dr. Maja Schachner will be the recipient of IAIR's Early Career Award at the biennial conference in Staten Island. Dr. Schachner earned a joint Ph.D. in Educational and Cross-cultural Psychology at the Friedrich-Schiller-Universitat in Jena, Germany and Tilburg University, Netherlands in 2013. Following her Ph.D. studies, Dr. Schachner completed two post-doctoral fellowships, first at the University of Postdam, Germany, followed by the College for Interdisciplinary Educational Research, Berlin, Germany.

Dr. Schachner has previously received the Butterworth Young Scientist Award from the *European Association of Developmental Psychology* and the Triandis Doctoral Thesis Award from the *International Association of Cross-Cultural Psychology*. Her research has been published in top education, intercultural relations, and cross-cultural psychology journals. In a very short time she has participated in an impressive range of research collaborations and has demonstrated a willingness to serve the academic community by reviewing articles for numerous scholarly journals.



Thanks to this meeting my interest in intercultural research began and has become the focus of my research for many years. The study of cultural distinctions, accompanied by my acquaintance with more than 80 countries of the world, has created the basis for my theoretical and empirical research in this area.

I enjoy moving around the world and experiencing the infinite cultural diversity which exists. Studying cultural diversity has helped me to develop methodologically integrative, eclectic approaches for social phenomenology analysis. It has also shaped my dialogical approach to psychological knowledge integration, resulting in both theoretical

LOGISTICS We are diligently planning the 2017 Biennial Conference. Registration will open January 2, 2017 for early bird discounts. Member registration is \$490.00 for early bird between January 2nd and April 15th, \$530.00 regular fee for registrants between April 16th and May 15th, and \$583.00 for late registrants between May 16th and June 10th. For Fellows, there is also an early bird discount for registration for the June 25 Fellows Day event as well. The conference will include prominent keynote speakers, several days of scholarly presentations and discussion, talks by Academy Award winners (scholars, not actors!), and several evenings of cultural programming. The conference will feature an extensive book exhibits area.



Fellow Guest Column

Recognizing the Benefits of Inter-disciplinarity

In 2012-13, I spent a sabbatical at the University of Oxford's Nissan Institute of Japanese Studies. While there, I completed a book titled, *At Home Abroad: The Contemporary Western Experience in Japan.* Toward the end of my stay at the Nissan Institute, I was given the opportunity to present my findings from the book project. A talented young sociologist who was tasked with introducing me approached right before the presentation, and asked quizzically, "What is it that you do again? You're not a sociologist, right? You're not an anthropologist. How can I explain your field?"

That confused exchange was the genesis of my next book, Crossing Boundaries and Weaving Intercultural Work, Life, and Scholarship in Globalizing Universi-

ties (Routledge). One of its aims is to forge common conceptual ground for researchers of culture, so I recruited an eclectic group of contributors: scholars in the fields of Cross-cultural Psychology and Intercultural Communication, such as David Sam and Anita Mak, but also sociologists, cultural anthropologists, cultural studies scholars, and most pivotally, my co-editor and co-author of two chapters, Zhu Hua (University of London)—an applied linguist.

In *Crossing Boundaries*, we identify four "schools" of intercultural communication studies, each which employs divergent ontological, epistemological, theoretical, and methodological orientations to culture. We also outline a position for allowing the inclusion of all of them, as each is valuable to understand better the work, life, and scholarship of transnational academics. From this point of departure, we forge more common ground between these schools of thought than is typically recognized, but also conclude that these schools cannot be reduced to facsimiles of each other; in fact, their substantial differences empower researchers from one orientation to "see" phenomena in ways that another might not.

For instance, Zhu Hua's research in interculturality stresses the key role in social interactions played by the orientation and negotiation of identity, while my own acculturation research focuses upon intergroup boundary permeability and belonging. Pairing them yields highly complementary findings as to what constitutes smooth, mutually-satisfying intercultural communication and how to actualize it. Zhu Hua highlights the reflexive relationship between discourse and social relations as well as the importance of aligning self-oriented identity and other-ascribed identity in intercultural interactions, while my acculturation model stresses the central role of belonging—i.e., acculturators' acceptance in their host society's cultural-linguistic community and/or as core members of their work organizations.

Though we employ different conceptual frameworks, nomenclatures, and theoretical assumptions, we fully agree: for positive intercultural relations to be established and maintained, complementary alignments of expectations, attitudes, and communicative behaviors between those living abroad and their hosts regarding who the transnational "is" and where s/he belongs in society are of paramount importance.

In Crossing Boundaries, by allowing for multiple approaches to coexist—rather than insisting on the correctness of only one—we are able to forge a richer view of the phenomena under examination. The resulting synergy enables us to see more of the intercultural domain spread before us via multiple vistas that represent unique, yet complementary scholarly viewpoints. By employing diverse approaches to researching intercultural communication, we gain a more nuanced portrait of transnational academics and how they weave work, life, and scholarship. My hope is that members of our IAIR community and others researching culture will more actively create rich collaborative relationships across disciplines, thus broadening our understanding of culture and how it impacts communication and intergroup relations.


